| The Houses of Scriven Green   | Two other houses in Scriven have smoke-blackened roofs, and in each of these there is a timber frame incorporating a smoke-bay. Home Farm is aisled like Park Corner. Its front door opens into a lobby screened off in front of the fire, from which you turn right into the original hall. The present stone fireplace was brought from another house in modern times, but it stands inside the frame of a timber smoke-hood, which itself was built within an earlier timber smoke-bay as described above. When the house was first built the smoke rose up within this bay to the upper part of the roof space and then drifted out through one of the gablets ('owl-holes') at the ends of the roof. In about 1600 the house was modernised and a hooded chimney built above the hearth to lead the smoke out through the roof; at the same time the whole lower part of the front wall was rebuilt in stone and other improvements made, so we must suppose that a house to which so much modernisation was then necessary had been built at least a century earlier. This very rough calculation puts the date of Home Farm somewhere about 1500. |

Elizabethan wall painting found in a downstairs room with a pattern of an heraldic bird. It was painted on plaster with a pattern of birds and flowers in blues and reds like tapestry. The most interesting piece of the plaster is two words and the beginning of a date, " FEARE HART 16..". In the main bedroom the roof is so high that there is room for a minstrel gallery in front of the chimney.   |

## Scriven Conservation

Within the village, small front gardens are bounded by stone walls, as is Park Corner Farm. However, the older houses on the Green- Home Farm, Rose Cottage and Peartree Cottage – have no front gardens but the wide grass verges outside maintain their privacy.

## Home Farm House

Late medieval with late sixteenth – early seventeenth century alterations and eighteenth – nineteenth encasing; restored about 1965-70. For further details see Home Farm Source reference 1157.

## A History of Scriven

Home Farm was built as a timber-framed house of 31 bays, with an aisle along the south side. The East end poets of the frame, with one of the slightly curved braces to the tie-beam are seen on the outside of the East wall. The roof is of plain rafter couples joined by collars to make a letter A: at each end are gablets to let the smoke out. The timbers which can be seen inside are soot-blackened, which points to an original open fire. The West end of the house was the service end and the North West room, the dairy. Sleeping quarters were at the East end. In the North East ground floor room, three of the walls have painted decorations of the late sixteenth or early seventeenth century. At this time too, the stone front wall with its recessed mullioned windows was built. The open fireplace had been replaced by a timber, and plaster chimney at this stage, and later by a brick one. In the early nineteenth century it was an inn, "The King's Head".
