The Houses of Scriven Green

There is another house in Scriven that was originally timber framed, and that is Corner Cottage. It is two-storeyed with two rooms at each level and a staircase between - a typical Georgian plan. Almost certainly, however, it was built as the cross-wing of a larger house; it is joined onto nos. 1 and 2 in just such a way as a wing would be if nos. 1 and 2 had been a fairly important house. In the mid 18th century when the brick walling was built, the best quality work in Flemish bond with a dentilled cornice went on the south side of 1 and 2 and the back of Corner Cottage, which is of course at the front of 1 and 2. At this date, then, they formed one house. Were they built together? We found no traces of timber in 1 and 2, but that does not say positively it cannot have been timber framed and we were not able to get into the roof to see where it abuts onto Corner Cottage. Supposing it was built as one house, then we have here a house about the same size as Home Farm but with proper upper rooms of full height in the wing. This could be earlier than the 17th century, but more important, it could also be socially different from Home Farm and the rest the home of a freeholder, perhaps, while the others were copyholders? Supposing more of the structure of 1 and 2 were to be exposed during alterations, some further evidence of its origins might turn up, but failing that the question must be left open.

Scriven Conservation

Grade II listed building of architectural significance.

Corner Cottage along with 1& 2 Village Terrace & The Old Smithy.

Corner Cottage was originally a timber framed house. It is of two storeys with two rooms at each level with a staircase between. Almost certainly built as a cross-wing of a larger house; joined to numbers 1 and 2 in such a way as a wing would be if 1 and 2 had been a fairly important house.

Dating from the seventeenth century with twentieth century restoration. It is built of small red/brown bricks in Flemish bond with twentieth century pantile roof with stone slate eaves course. It has brick end stacks, that to the left being the earliest.

The central porch is twentieth century. It has twentieth century small paned windows without sills or lintels with three lights on the left and two lights to the right, those to the first floor are just below the eaves line.

Rear: The wallplate is visible below the dentilled eaves. When the brick walling was built the best quality was at the rear which would have been the front of 1 and 2 as at this date they formed one house.
