There was a very small attendance at the meeting of the Knaresborough Rural Council on Wednesday. Mr W. Atkinson presided, and the other members present were the Rev. D. M. Alexander, Messrs. J. Barker, Stanley Barnes, J. T. Morrell and T. Smith, with Mr Chas F. Smith (clerk), Mr J. H. Halstead (surveyor), Mr W. Lupton (inspector), and Dr. Forbes (Medical Officer).

A letter was read from Mr A. Baldrige asking for permission to erect a railway carriage at "Stonefall," Wetherby Lane, for a dwelling house. Seeing that houses were so bad to get they were bound to do that for the time being.

In reply to the Chairman, the Clerk said that would make their third such building.

20 The Inspector in reply to a question, said the owner had to make satisfactory arrangements for drainage. He understood the agreement was to erect a house in three years.

The application was granted subject to the usual conditions as to notice for removal.
